VLADIMIR - THE WILL TO SURVIVE

When Vladimir first came to us he looked like he was at death's door. He was scrappy looking and had wounds on his head, an upper respiratory infection and was not neutered. In his eyes you could see the look of misery and defeat. He was brought to us by a lady who was the pet-sitter for an elderly woman who had recently passed away. He had lived a life as an indoor/outdoor cat and was free to roam the neighborhood as he wished. His tattered ears showed us that he had been in many cat fights during his life. However, our cat volunteers Jill and Thecla were optimistic that our vets would get him cleaned up and healthy...and neutered. But, it wasn't long after he was dropped off at the spay/neuter clinic that they called us and said "you need to come get this cat, he's basically dying." This was especially disheartening since we had realized what a sweet, loving, and affectionate cat he was. As scary and rough as he looked, he was really one of the friendliest cats we can say we have ever come across.

Determined not to give up on this warmhearted fellow, Thecla rushed Vladimir to another vet's office that was equipped to handle illness. Vladimir's wounds (infected abscess) were treated and his upper respiratory infection was addressed. It was also discovered that he had a heart murmur and was FIV-positive. He spent a long time recuperating at Jill's house and slowly started to recover. Despite being so sick, he was always so gentle and open to petting and scratching and snuggling. He has since regained his strength and is looking & feeling much better these days.

Vladimir is now up for adoption and desperately hopes to find a permanent home where he can spend as much time as possible on any person's lap. He has Russian Blue coloring and is likely 6-8 years old. Despite being FIV-positive, he has a chance at a fairly long life. He does not take any daily meds. FIV Feline Immuno Deficiency Virus) is not transmitted to humans or dogs. It can only be passed to other cats through deep bite wounds. It is no longer believed that FIV (Feline Immunodeficiency Virus) can be passed to other cats by simple, casual contact. Adopting a cat that is FIV-positive (if you have another cat) is a decision you should make after consulting your veterinarian. We are convinced that when the right family comes along for Vladimir, they will be undeniably pleased that they chose him. IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN!



New Mexico's beautiful Spring and Summer seasons also bring a third season for PACA/AAR...KITTEN SEASON! This year certainly did not disappoint. At the time of this publication PACA had 25 litters of kittens in foster homes. Most of these kittens are brought in by our feral cat TNR team. They do not just trap, sterilize, and release feral adults. They often trap pregnant cats, nursing mothers, and the kittens themselves. If we trap a lactating mother we go to



great lengths to find her kittens. It is not unusual for our TNR volunteers to crawl under houses, through ceiling spaces, and into other secluded areas they probably shouldn't be venturing into. But they never fail to eventually find the litters that are inevitably crying out for their mothers. As long as the kittens are 6 weeks or less, they are tame and make great adoptable pets.

Keaton has done all of this consistently for the last 3 years. His favorite job though is fostering dogs of his favorite breed: pits and pit mixes. Keaton tells us he will be back after graduate school, and we will anxiously be waiting. But for now he on to the next adventure in his

If you are an animal lover who also likes to rescue dogs, the worst thing that can happen to you is to have a neighbor who is a neglectful pet owner. Our long-time volunteer and rescuer Sally has lived with this burden for years. Sally lives in a remote village between two different reservations. Not a single day goes by without seeing at least one desperate, stray dog hanging around any location that she may be at. She also passes many houses with several dogs chained up in yards often without enough shelter, water or food. One particular neighbor of Sally's has been taking in stray dogs for years. However his idea of saving these poor creatures is to chain them up or place them in small cages in his yard. Sally was constantly trying to help the dogs by providing food and supplies they often lacked. Over the years she was able to talk this neighbor into giving her some of the dogs so that she could bring them to PACA to be adopted out. Sally would take the two-hour trip to Albuquerque to bring these dogs to their vet appointments and to adoption clinics to find loving new families.

Recently the neighbor went away suddenly and abandoned all the dogs on his property. Sally started to feed the dogs, and wanted to take possession of the 7 dogs so that she could help them. But the local Animal Control Officer told her she could not take them, as they were still owned by the man regardless of where he was. Sally continued to feed the dogs daily, yet she was still not allowed to rescue Cinnamon or any of the others from their suffering. Sally had watched Cinnamon suffer in a small cage for a very long time. Cinnamon continually produced litters of pups that Sally was able to take and bring to PACA to adopt out. The owner was not, however, willing to let Sally provide Cinnamon with a free spay offered by PACA. One day Sally noticed that Cinnamon had (again) delivered 5 pups in the dirt in the small cage. Requests to take possession of Cinnamon and her pups were repeatedly denied by family members that occasionally showed up to the abandoned house. One night a crazed bear tore through the entire village attacking and killing pets and livestock throughout the entire area. He attacked and killed one of the dogs that was chained up in the yard. He then tried to attack Cinnamon and her pups through the poorly-built, rickety cage. Cinnamon fiercely protected her pups and was able to keep them safe from the bear. The horrific event came to an end when a resident farther away shot and killed the bear after it killed some of his goats.

After that terrifying event, the neighbor's family finally allowed Sally to take Cinnamon and her two pups. The neighbors had already given away three of the pups. But Cinnamon was finally free of her life of misery, and she and her pups immediately received medical care. They were now sleeping in a warm house with plenty of food, water, and affection. It did not take long for Cinnamon's pups, Crystal and Cindy Lou to find their forever, loving homes through PACA. Cinnamon also recently found her forever home with Karen and her new doggy sibling Roxie.

EUGENE - "Eugene is really warming up to us. He loves snuggling up close to us and rubbing against us. He won't stop purring, you can really tell he is happy."





BEAUTY (top) with new brother Elwood. The whole family loves Beauty, and Elwood certainly does not mind having her "laying around".





COOPER with his new mommy Theresa. He has two new canine sisters!




HEIDI/CALI has a new family that finds her delightful and fun.

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
