Seal's Story

Like many dogs in New Mexico, my beginning was rough, but my life has turned out great thanks to PACA and my foster moms. For the first year of my life I lived on a big chain outside in the heat and



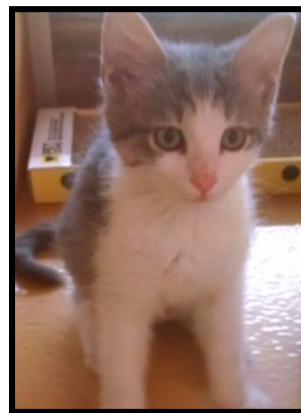
cold. I lived with my family but they treated me bad by abusing and neglecting me. They injured my spine and broke my tail. Somehow I wound up at a vet's office that didn't give up on me. The injuries made me incontinent. That means I can't go poop or pee on my own and I can't control it either. I have to wear a diaper and a wrap when I'm in the car or in the house. I sleep in my kennel all night with my wrap and diaper on. I don't try to take it off cause I know it helps me. My foster family has my hygiene routine down to less than five minutes! I love the kisses and the cookies I get when they are doing my routine. I have had to have my tail amputated because it was dead and infected from the abuse. I like it much better without my tail. I can sit down now.

Even with all these problems, which I am totally unaware of since I am a dog, I am a happy,

ADOPTING A SPECIAL NEEDS CAT

In the many years of being a Cat Foster Mom, I have had some special needs kittens who required different approaches to their care. A cat missing a limb, a blind or deaf cat, or even an HIV+ cat can live long and rewarding lives. Truth be told special needs pets are not defined by their circumstances.

They are not aware of how they are different from other animals. A 3-legged cat can learn to run, jump and play as if they had 4 limbs. A blind cat uses their hearing and sense of smell to navigate their environment. FIV+ cats are best as the single cat in the home but could also live with other non-aggressive cats. All of these special needs do not preclude the cats from having playmates and loving their human caregivers. I have cared for two special needs kittens that had a neurological disorder called Cerebella Hypoplasia (CH) most often caused by an infection transmitted from their mom while in utero. These kittens have a wobbly head, imbalance walking and fall over. The first kitten had poor motor control so her litter box needed to have high sides for her to lean against. Rugs provided better traction than hard floors. She could not jump on any furniture so her bed

sweet dog. I have learned lots of tricks and commands. I love children and I love other dogs. I play rough sometimes. My foster Mom tells me “No” and I listen most of the time.

A few weeks ago I learned I was going on an exciting adventure. I rode in an RV to Michigan to my new home. Friends of my foster moms wanted to adopt me. When I got to Michigan, a nice trainer was waiting for me to help me get acquainted with the family and their other dog. I have daily play sessions in the back yard and enjoy hanging out with my forever family. These humans amaze me. They do some odd things, like walk on two legs, but they can be so caring and loving towards a dog like me. I am grateful to PACA for taking care of my medical bills and buying all my diapers. We’ve even had some managers step up and defend us against unhappy people who have been turned away for one reason or another. I am extremely lucky to have found a great group of people who love cats as much as I do, and I look forward to many more years of volunteering!

New logo, same great cause! Affordable or free spay/neuter for cats and dogs is a huge contributor to solving the pet overpopulation problem in New Mexico. PACA’s ‘Fix the 505’ program offers free spay/neuter to outdoor cats and lower income households’ dogs. Our new logo includes the words “Margaret Bobb Memorial Spay/Neuter Program.” Dedicated PACA volunteer Margaret Bobb noted her pride in this program, which she was integral in starting, in her diary. Margaret also wrote that she would like to see the “Fix the 505” program cover all of Albuquerque. She also wanted this program to be her legacy after her death. Margaret canvassed neighborhoods in South Valley to inform residents about the free spay/neuter program. She always supported the participating veterinarians by bringing them cookies or donuts as a thank you. Fix the 505 has expanded to all of Albuquerque thanks to our new partner, Gonzales Mobile Vet. With our other continuing partners, South Valley Animal Clinic, Western Trails Veterinary Hospital, and VetCo, “Fix the 505” spayed/neutered 195 dogs and 750 cats so far this year. Sadly, Margaret died in 2018, but her legacy will live on with your generous donation to the PACA Fix the 505 program. 100% of your donation goes directly to spay/neuter costs.

Bodhi / Brock

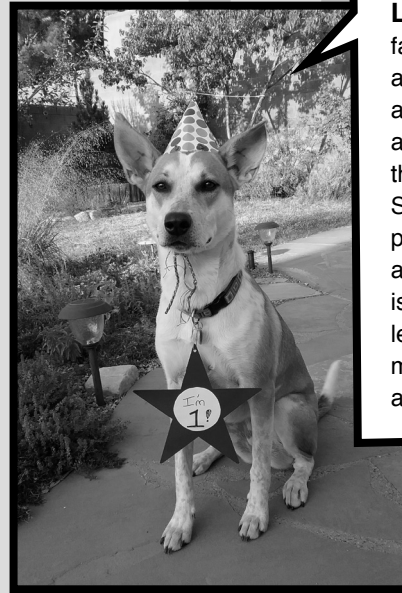

Love my baby kitty! Thank you guys for everything you do!! **Kona** (was Gertrude) cat with big eyes.



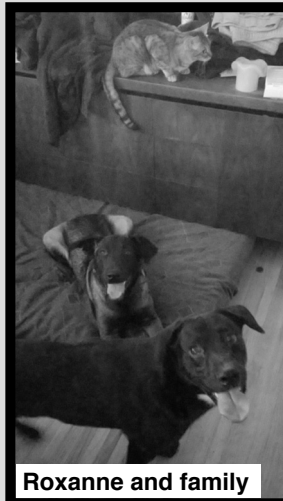

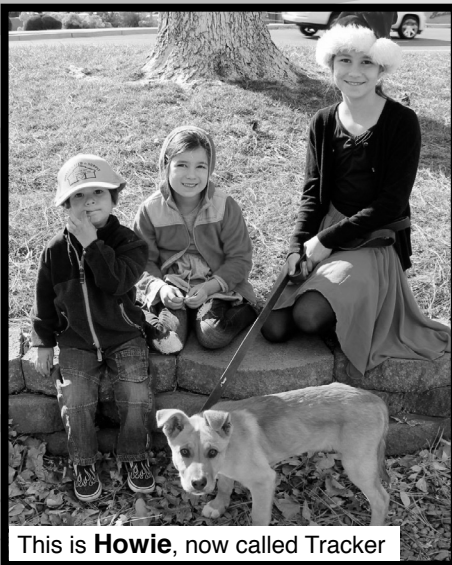


Foxy

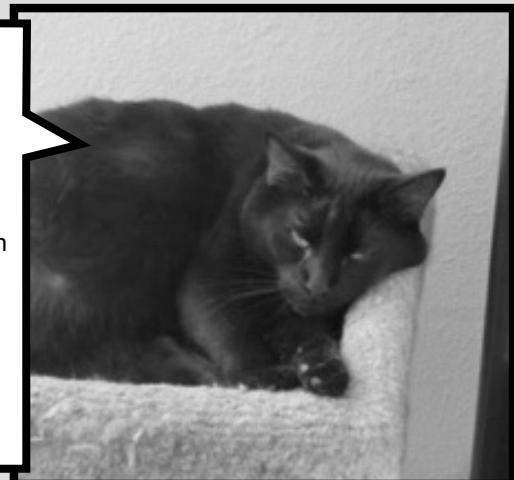

HOARDER BUST RESULTS IN PACA DOGS

PACA volunteer and dog trainer, Julie Hart, received a call about a hoarding case in San Miguel County in March of 2019. The Animal Welfare Coalition (AWC) had seized 32 dogs from a property in Ilfeld, NM. This person had another property with 63 dogs on it in Rowe; a total of 95 dogs in all. Julie was told these dogs were the most damaged dogs AWC had ever seen. Julie went to evaluate the dogs and verified they were indeed quite damaged from the hoarding situation or feral. There were five juvenile puppies that were completely feral, likely never touched by humans. The adults ranged from slightly fearful to feral. Things looked grim for these dogs at first. The large number and severe fearfulness was overwhelming for the AWC. AWC could not adopt out the dogs because the hoarder would not release custody and the judge wouldn't make her.

After meeting these dogs, Julie kept going to AWC to rehabilitate them. Even though Julie had rehabilitated fearful dogs for 10 years, many Ilfeld dogs were more severe than her previous cases. Many of the dogs learned to want human interaction and walk on leash, but others were much more difficult. Julie organized training for herself and the shelter staff with Nelson Hodges, experienced feral dog rehabilitator. The training workshop was a great success, attracting dog trainers from all over the USA. Julie learned how to help the more difficult dogs and went to work.

By the time the hoarder released custody of the dogs in September 2019, all the dogs could be walked on leash and associate with people. PACA welcomed seven dogs from this hoarding case into the rescue. Julie organized transport of five other dogs to the East Coast for further rehab and adoption. PACA foster parents continued rehabilitating the PACA dogs until they were ready for adoption. Each of the Ilfeld and Rowe dogs has found their special person and home. These adopters are special people. They have patience and understand the dogs need guidance, but not pity, to continue to grow. Working with fearful dogs is very rewarding and there is always a need for fearful dog adopters in New Mexico. Julie ended up keeping one of the dogs named Hawkeye. He is happy living in her home with her three other dogs. PACA appreciates all the dedicated foster families and the adopters that made this hoarding case have a happy ending.

Gene's Story

Gene was brought to the Valencia County Animal Shelter as a stray. He was picked up by Animal Control in Meadow Lake; where they assumed he had been scavenging on his own for a long

time. I saw his photo online and knew I wanted to help and PACA agreed! Based on his photos, I thought he was brindle, but meeting him in person, I realized he just REALLY needed a good bath/brushing. We knew his tongue was impressively long (hence the name Gene Simmons) but didn't know why, so PACA immediately scheduled an appointment with him to be evaluated by TLC Pet Hospital. The good news was that it was not a neurological issue and he still had full control and feeling. The bad news was they discovered the reason for his tongue hanging out was because he was missing almost all of his teeth on the bottom left side of his jaw. Upon further dental examination, they realized that all of his teeth were in really bad shape. They assume he had been a stray and/or malnourished for a long time, so ate things he shouldn't (like rocks) trying to survive. A lot of his teeth were missing completely and all of his remaining teeth were fractured and/or impacted. Instead of having all of them removed,

PACA coordinated a consultation with Veterinary Dentistry & Oral Surgery of NM. PACA paid for Gene to undergo multiple surgeries there to salvage as many remaining teeth as possible. Gene has clearly had a rough life, but you wouldn't know it by meeting him. He is the sweetest, goofiest pup. What he lacks in teeth, he certainly makes up for in personality. Gene has adjusted so well to a new kind of life - He is house trained and crate trained. He loves long walks, but loves snuggling up on the couch with people even more. I am so grateful that PACA gave this pup the second chance at life that he was so deserving of. It has been such a joy to foster him the last few months. Gene is currently enjoying life with his foster family, patiently awaiting his forever home. We love his "up for anything" attitude. I may be a bit biased, but this dog would make an incredible companion for just about anyone.

About Us

PEOPLE'S ANTI-CRUELTY ASSOCIATION/ ALBUQUERQUE ANIMAL RESCUE (PACA/ AAR), a No-Kill rescue group, was founded in 1973. Our main mission is to rescue, rehabilitate and rehouse homeless dogs and cats. PACA has no shelter facility and relies on an organized network of foster parents who graciously take animals into their homes and hearts until permanent homes are found.

RESCUE: No-Kill means that healthy, adoptable animals are not destroyed because they are homeless or to make room for another animal. The Care-For-Life concept allows PACA to offer an alternative program for homeless, abandoned, sick, and injured animals. The number of animals we can assist depends on the foster care and financial resources available.

REHABILITATE: PACA devotes resources to correct an animal's health or behavioral problems.

REHOUSE: Care-For-Life rescue requires short and long term temporary housing for animals. This is best met by foster caregivers, not traditional kennel facilities. Foster families are asked to provide transportation to adoption clinics as much as they are able.

SPAY/NEUTER: PACA operates and funds programs to provide spay/neuter in the community, and we trap feral cats for the Trap-Neuter-Return program. We have already had significant success in preventing cat and dog population growth in Albuquerque.
