TNR: Fighting A Losing Battle—And Winning By Margaret Bobb

Albuquerque and its surrounding communities have a huge feral cat problem. The over-population problem has a lot to do with our warm climate: feral cats can survive our mild winters and even breed year-round. For example, PACA/AAR's feral cat team recently trapped and sterilized 21 cats in a local trailer park. They had just trapped and sterilized in that same park about 1 ½ years ago! PACA/AAR has always been involved in trapping, sterilizing, and releasing in feral cat "colonies." Our current team (Jill, Mark, and Thecla) has tremendously increased their trapping efforts over

the past three years. Thanks to their hard work and dedication, PACA/AAR (with some financial help from Best Friends Animal Sanctuary) has been able to trap, sterilize and release over 400 feral cats this year so far!

The job is not an easy one. It is very time-consuming and includes driving all over Albuquerque. It usually starts with a call from a concerned citizen (often the person feeding the colony). Strategy and planning is required to determine the best time to start the trapping. It is usually done at the colony's regular feeding time, dawn or dusk. Our team sets traps baited with yummy food. Normally it requires two or more days and multiple trips before every cat in a colony is trapped. The cats - scared and defensive - are transported to volunteers' homes and placed in quiet rooms or garages and covered with blankets to await surgery the next day. During surgery, each cat receives vaccinations and their left ear is "tipped" to show that they have been fixed in case future trapping is done in that area. Extra treatment is given to sick or injured cats. After sterilization, the cats spend another night at volunteers' homes to recover. The following day they are released back to their community and to their "feeders," who have usually grown attached to most of them.

Unexpected catches are common. Occasionally a tame cat is trapped. These cats may have been owned at one time, but are now living in a feral colony. If they have a microchip, they can often be reunited with their owner. When small kittens are encountered, the determination has to be made as to whether or not they are small and tame enough to be adopted. The rule of thumb is that if the kitten can be easily picked up by hand (without needing to be trapped) it might be tame enough to be adopted out at our adoption clinic (see article on page 3). When small kittens are rescued, every effort is made to guarantee that their mother is caught and spayed as well (cont. on pg. 2).

(cont. from pg. 1) PACA's trapping of over 400 feral cats in 2014 more than doubles our number of 152 in 2013. Albuquerque Animal Control has reported a significant decrease of intake of stray cats/kittens over the past few years. We are making a difference. However, the Best Friends surgical funding runs out in the spring of 2015. We were so amazed when her owners brought her by to visit a year later, and we saw that she was walking on her half-severed foot without the prosthetic! Her owners report that she still wears the prosthetic on her two walks each day, but around the house she does not need it. ORANGE: The "In" Color This Fall by Margaret Bobb

When setting out to trap feral cats for sterilization our TNR (Trap/Neuter/Return) team has learned that they have to be prepared for surprises. Where there are cats, there are bound to be kittens. Recently the PACA/AAR TNR team encountered a colony of 23 cats and kittens. They discovered that one litter of seven kittens (all orange tabbies) was tame enough to keep and eventually adopt out. The kitties approached the volunteers and were easy to pick up and handle.

The other litter took some work. The mother was trapped, but locating her very young kittens was not as easy. Their "mews" were heard coming from the insulation of the mobile home at the site. Rescuing them required crawling under the home and digging blindly through the layers of insulation to grab tiny, days-old kittens that had been tucked in there by their mother. This litter of six kittens was also ALL ORANGE. These tiny babies were reunited with their mother to nurse. They were also supplemented with bottle feeding by Thecla, the brave adventurer who had crawled under the home to fetch them.

The older orange kittens have been spayed and are ready for adoption. The younger batch will be ready soon. Finding enough foster homes for this bounty of kittens was a challenge, but we managed to get them all squared away. Luckily, we don't have to find foster homes for the occasional raccoons, skunks, squirrels, or turtles that also end up in the traps!

Most of us know Cesar Millan from TV. We know his theories of calm, assertive energy, being pack leader, and exercise, discipline, and affection. But I witnessed the real Cesar Millan when I represented PACA at the Training Cesar's Way Workshop on a scholarship from the Millan Foundation. Cesar taught the entire workshop, starting every day with a pack walk of 43 dogs and people. Then we had lectures or demonstrations showing us how to get dogs on treadmills, in pools, or to socialize in a dog park. A silent, meditative walk completed the last morning. Since I had this amazing experience, I wanted to share a few things about Cesar Millan most people don't know. First, he is really a comedian. He kept us laughing with jokes and funny drawings. He made jokes about himself and his dogs. Cesar and his staff were very genuine. There was no pretentiousness from Cesar or his trainers, just a yearning to share knowledge. He was considerate but truthful to the students when answering their questions. The infamous "Holly" from Cesar's Worst Bite lives at the Dog Psychology Center because she cannot live anywhere else safely. Cesar keeps working because he believes in his message and wants to help troubled dogs and owners. Even Cesar Millan is limited by zoning laws. He plans to expand the Dog Psychology Center with a coffee shop, a retreat area, and lots of fruit trees. I learned that his ability to "Tsch" a dog into calm submission is real. Surprisingly, I learned Cesar and his gorgeous girlfriend can really burn up the dance floor. I left the workshop feeling rejuvenated, relaxed and part of a new community of friends. You Don't Have to Be a Superhero to Foster by Lesley Judd

I've wanted to foster cats for as long as I knew that was a thing you could do. I've been fostering for about ten years now, but it took me a long time to take the plunge - I thought there were things preventing me from fostering, or that I couldn't at that time in my life, when in reality, I could have begun years earlier. I thought that I couldn't foster since I had cats of my own already. What if they fought? Turns out my dominant cat is a real leader and puts the scared fosters at ease, and even helps socialize them! What if the fosters were sick? Well, I've learned to put cats in a bedroom in isolation until they have been de-wormed,

treated for any ailments, and have undergone a quarantine period to make sure they aren't sick. Other fosters don't mix their cats at all. Many potential foster parents are worried that they won't be able to part with their fosters. It's true we've had several foster parents adopt their wards, but in my and many others' cases, we know that sending them off to the adoption center makes room to help more cats in need. Other potential fosters feel they don't have time to tend to a foster cat - perhaps they have a full house already, with kids, dogs, and full-time jobs. Well, we have plenty of foster parents in that situation, too! Kids and dogs are great for socializing pets to live in homes, and we often need a foster home for a healthy, socialized pet until there is room at the adoption center or they are old enough to be spayed/neutered, and no extra care is required. So if you've always wanted to foster, take the plunge! There's a cat out there who needs you.

PACA/AAR's No-Kill and "Care for Life" policies have always been taken seriously, but it's not always easy. However, we always believe that there is the perfect, forever home out there for every animal we rescue. Take, for example, Butch and Beckett. Butch came to us in April from a hoarding situation in southern New Mexico. He was rescued and placed in a foster home. They had the perfect situation for Butch: no other dogs, loving owners, and even grandkids! His own posture-pedic bed and handmade quilt were the icing on the cake. He received complete medical care for all of his medical problems, and we consulted doggy behaviorists, trying many different approaches to help him with his behavior issues.



Then along came his angel, Gay. She determined that Beckett was just a complex guy who happened to be "about the most handsome beagle alive with a personality as big as the sky!" She agreed to be his foster mom. Then Beckett had a bout of seizures that caused him to walk backwards. A long two years have passed since PACA/AAR took Beckett on, and after surviving heartworm and seizures and bouncing around from place to place, we received the jubilant news that Gay wanted to adopt Beckett as her birthday present to herself. She loves the heck out of him and says that "I don't think he'll ever settle down," but she admires him for that.

Although Max and Beckett may be responsible for a few extra grey hairs among PACA volunteers, seeing them so happy with their new forever families made it all worth it. Besides, there's always Clairrol.

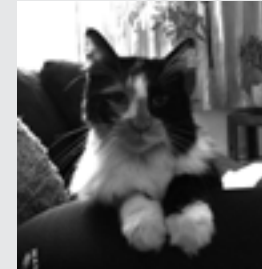

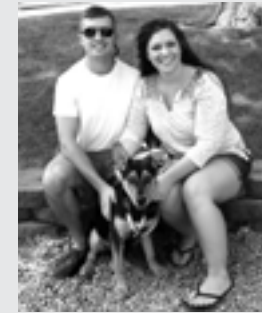
HAPPY TAILS

change her name because she responds to it. We call her Girl or Little Girl for short.



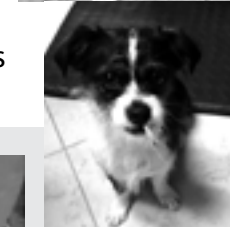
Deuce is thrilled to be with his new forever family Nicholas & Cassidy. He's gone from death row to learning his commands in German!

Primo finally has a home after two years in a foster home!



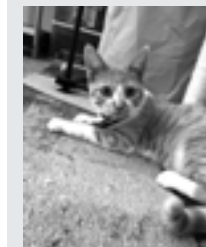

Iris tells us Sofia loves her new family. She is a very happy little girl. Thank you, Lanya!



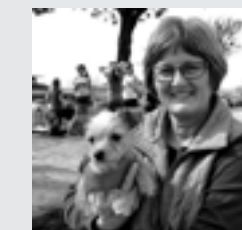

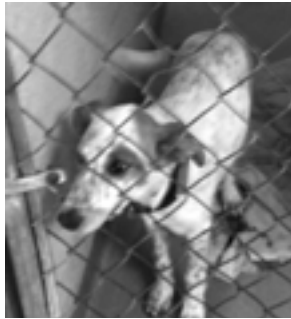

About Us

THE PEOPLE'S ANTI-CRUELTY ASSOCIATION/ALBUQUERQUE ANIMAL RESCUE (PACA/AAR), a No-Kill rescue group, was founded in 1973. Our main mission is to rescue, rehabilitate and rehouse homeless dogs and cats. PACA has no shelter facility and relies on an organized network of foster parents who graciously take animals into their homes and hearts until permanent homes are found.

RESCUE: No-Kill means that healthy, adoptable animals are not destroyed because they are homeless or to make room for another animal. The No-Kill concept allows PACA to offer an alternative program for homeless, abandoned, sick, and injured animals. The number of animals we can assist depends on the foster care and financial resources available.

REHABILITATE: PACA devotes resources to correct an animal's health or behavioral problems.

REHOUSE: No-Kill rescue requires short and long term temporary housing for animals. This is best met by foster caregivers, not traditional kennel facilities. Foster families are asked to provide transportation to adoption clinics as much as they are able.

SPAY/NEUTER: PACA operates and funds programs to provide spay/neuter in the community, and we trap feral cats for the Trap-Neuter-Return program. We have already had significant success in preventing cat and dog population growth in Albuquerque.
